



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Chapter 4: Who Is Jesus?

If you want to create an awkward silence at a business lunch or dinner party, ask the question, "Who is Jesus?" Mention God and you're within most social boundaries. But, Jesus, He provokes intense reactions. What is it about God's Son that triggers that kind of response? Could it be that Jesus causes people to examine their lives with more honesty? If Jesus is the flashpoint, does that mean our feelings about Him must be examined as well? Are we free to be bored with Him or to embrace faith in Him disinterestedly?



What do we label a person who is so bound to strict religiosity they can't see past their rules? Someone so enamored with their own picture of how things are supposed to be they can't entertain different options? A close-minded person? A legalist? We call such people Pharisees.

The Pharisees began as the elite, the respected leaders of their day. Today the term Pharisee is instantly understood as a parody of righteousness. A caricature of uppity religion.

For two millennia the designation has served as a byword for spiritual blindness. But in the beginning they were the insiders. If God were to show up, surely they would be the first to recognize Him.

But they didn't.


The Pharisees—who had memorized their Bibles—not only missed the truth about Jesus, they rallied their entire political machinery against Him. Here's why: He didn't fit their preconceived notions. Everything they assumed the Messiah would be, Jesus was not.

And that's the danger we face today. Our ideas about Jesus get in the way of our understanding of Him. The challenge is to allow Jesus to speak for Himself. Instead of confirming or refuting our concept of Him, allowing Him to define Himself.

Jesus' Humanity

Jesus claimed to be both fully human and fully God. Let's examine these claims:

Did Jesus experience normal human feelings? What about boredom or confusion? What about temptation, even lust? Did he grow weary? Get hungry?

The Bible describes Jesus in physical and emotional terms:

"And Jesus grew in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and men." Luke 2:52
